

Double Success for Bellinge

LUGE congratulations are due to Bellinge for their success in attaining two prestigious awards: Northamptonshire Partnership Homes - Best Community Garden 2017 Gold Award, and Northampton in Bloom - Community Group Gold Award 2017.

During 2016 Bellinge Community House. a registered local charity based in Bellinge Ward within the Parish of Great Billing, applied for funding from Groundworks under the Tesco carrier bag scheme. Our organisational aim was to make small improvements around the area in which we are based - and that was the start of Bellinge Gets Better. We chose this project name based on the views of residents in 2017 living in the parish, and the need to have a more positive outlook for our young people rather than the negativity from over 20 years ago lingering - in their view still feeling stigmatised, and that view is not supportive of how they would like to view where they live. Working with the community, starting with Bellinge Youth Group 8-12 years, to begin with we planted over 350 Bulbs. We received many positive comments when spring arrived in 2017 and an array of colour adorned the local hub where many residents in the parish use the community facilities of the Co-op, takeaways, the local pub, Bellinge Community House or Bellinge Community Centre. We knew we wanted to keep improving the aesthetics for local people and decided to have a plan that was supported by our Ward Councillor Andrew Kilbride and, at that time the Mayor, Cllr Christopher Malpas.

We started off this project with residents providing support and it has gone from an idea to a reality. It's been a huge success, combining the hard work of lead volunteer on this project Jon Porter, and with Parish Councillor Dennis Nash, who is also Trustee of Bellinge Community House, playing an active role in the project.

The community response to the improvements has been overwhelming messages on our Facebook page, comments from the residents and businesses, with ad hoc donations from the community have been unexpected but rewarding.

As a result of this we have small groups of residents taking part in looking after their areas. This is a positive step in keeping the area a more pleasant place to live and bring up families.

Phase One - Preparing the area, we had the support of NBC Wardens and would like to thank Sarah Oakes for her support and that of her colleagues. Additionally, we had two groups of volunteers from out of the area.

With the bulbs turning heads and making their first appearance and bringing much needed colour, the project that has been started is hopefully making an impact.

This year the Group has undertaken two volunteering sessions a month, but, from October, reverted to one session a month over the autumn and winter periods.

I was, at that time, already concerned regarding the condition of and lack of use of the sports pavilion and playing fields at Great Billing, and the original group that had created Great Billing Pocket Park had long since ceased to exist.

The pavilion itself had graffiti adorning its walls and there was regular evidence of drug use and glue sniffing around the building particularly at the rear. It was decided that we needed somebody to look after our assets.

Following the appointment of the original Green Space Manager (he was tempted away from us), I was one of the councillors who interviewed and subsequently appointed Chris Campling as our new GSM.

Great Billing Conservation Area

The contribution that historic areas make to our quality of life is widely recognised. They are a link to the past that can give us a sense of continuity and stability and they have the reassurance of the familiar which can provide a point of reference in a rapidly changing world.

The way building traditions and settlement patterns are superimposed and survive over time will be unique to each area. This local distinctiveness can provide a catalyst for regeneration and inspire well designed new development which brings economic and social benefits. Change is inevitable." Northampton Borough Council is currently undertaking a review of Great Billing Conservation Area as part of an ongoing duty they have to review all of the 21 conservation areas in Northampton. An Appraisal and Management Plan has been produced and a formal period of public consultation with the Parish Council and residents living within the Conservation area will run for six weeks from the end of

October. The purpose of the appraisal is to identify those elements which contribute to the special character and appearance of a conservation area and to specify management proposals that aim to safeguard that special character. The suggestion is that the existing boundary of the Conservation Area remains unaltered.

NBC is also seeking views on whether there would be support for the introduction of an Article 4 Direction; this would mean that planning permission would in future be required for any alterations affecting the external appearance of properties, such as changing original windows or paving over front gardens.

No planning fee would be required for an application and the measure (which has been introduced in six conservation areas in Northampton) would give greater control over alterations which could affect the traditional appearance of the area. If there is general support for an Article 4 Direction at this stage, then separate detailed consultation explaining the restrictions will be undertaken and a report taken to Cabinet for their approval before the Direction comes into effect.

Jesus - A Light in the Darkness

PEOPLE often say that when you are young, Christmas is the most wonderful time of the year. As the father of four young children I can certainly attest to the truth of this! From the magical atmosphere in the shops, to the extended time with the family, to the feast of rich food, to the fun of tearing into the presents under on Christmas morning - our children absolutely love Christmas. And I was exactly the same when I was young. When you are young, Christmas truly is magical.

But when we grow up, many of us will know that the magic of Christmas starts to fade. We start to realise that world is not quite as safe and secure as we once thought. Even though we might still share the time with our loved ones, gathered around warmth of a roaring fire, or the dazzling lights of the Christmas tree, we know deep down that there is a darkness in the world.

For example, on Christmas day this year 250,000 elderly Britons will be eating alone, with only a television screen for company; 120,000 children will be living with their families in emergency homeless accommodation; 500,000 UK families will have an empty seat at the dinner table having lost someone this year and 80,000 families will be celebrating with a loved one behind bars.

So where is our hope at this time of year? Do we just stoke the fire to make it even warmer? Or turn up the lights to drive out the dark? Or drink more mulled wine until the pain goes away? The bible tells us of a better hope. For about 700 years before the birth of the baby Jesus, Isaiah wrote of his coming with these words.

The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned (Isaiah 9v2).

It's dark in the bible when Christmas comes. The world was just as damaged as it is today, with death, disease and sickness abounding. There was poverty, hunger and homelessness on a grand scale. And for the
